

Writing concisely

At university most of your assignments will have a required word length. While at first you may think it will be hard to write 1500 words on an unfamiliar topic, once you start researching it is not uncommon to have to cut words from your assignments. Assignment requirements generally allow you a margin of 10% over or under your word allocation, therefore it is important not to waste words with unnecessary language. Writing concisely improves the readability of your writing also. Consider these tips on word choices.

Do not use more words than is needed. Your reader should not have to deal with unnecessary information to get to the point.

Avoid saying the same thing twice, this is called a tautology.

blue NOT blue in colour

streamlined NOT streamlined in appearance

introduction NOT initial introduction round NOT round in shape

Write succinctly. Avoid abstract (nominalised) language which may be grammatically correct but can sound vague.

X This paper gives an analysis of the problem and offers a solution.

 $\sqrt{}$ This paper analyses the problem and solves it.

reported	NOT	gave a report	
decided	NOT	made a decision	
suggested	NOT	offered a suggestion	
announced	NOT	made an announcement	
catalysed	NOT	served as a catalyst	
increased	NOT	resulted in an increase	
destroyed	NOT	led to the destruction	

Avoid clichés these are overused expressions which make sentences unnecessarily long and detract from the meaning.

- take the bull by the horns = to confront
- done and dusted = completed
- tried and true = reliable
- at the end of the day = in conclusion/ summary





Remove unnecessary words that add no meaning.

Numerous people, who are concerned for the environment are volunteering their time, which is precious, to local Landcare and waterways groups that are trying to replant vegetation along riverbanks and clear creek beds from rubbish that is currently littering and clogging them (42 words).

Revised: Numerous local residents are volunteering their precious time to help environmental groups clear rubbish and replant vegetation along suburban creeks and riverbanks. (22 words).

Use fewer words by replacing more informal language with single academic words.
